Read the Partner Story

In Tonga, Kapiolani is a fan weaver and passionate home gardener. Her home is surrounded by vegetables, banana and breadfruit trees, pele and flowers, flourishing with the compost she learned to make at a workshop run by our partner. She knows she will improve her family's livelihood by raising chickens in her new chicken house. With more training on

climate change, she can help her community prepare for future disasters.

Our partner Tonga Community
Development Trust has been working
through its local groups to help Tongans
recover after last year's eruption and
tsunami. It is running psychosocial
training so people can help those living
with loss and trauma. After natural
disasters, families need practical
support and love.

Lectionary Thoughts

Relationships are central to these readings: Nathan to David, David and Yahweh, Paul and the Christians in Rome, Mary and the angel Gabriel, Mary and God. Faith happens between people and God – it is much more than a warm feeling or the certainty of being right.

We have had four weeks to get ready.
What have we been carrying on this
Advent journey? Who are our
companions? What is God saying to us?

II Samuel 7:1-11, 16

Nathan makes his first appearance as David's trusty advisor or oracle. After many years of wandering, David has settled down and constructed a permanent house of cedar. When he tells Nathan he wants to build a permanent house for the Ark of the Lord, Nathan at first agrees. But in the evening, Nathan hears from Yahweh – the 'not yet' message. For now, the Ark needs to stay in the tent (perhaps allowing for it to be shared more with different groups who have given their allegiance to David), but in time, David's descendants will build a 'house' for it (v.11) and David's 'throne established forever (v.16). There is a sense of eternity in these words of covenant – faith connects us with history and puts us in touch with what is lasting.

Psalm 89:1-4, 19-26

In the opening words, the psalmist praises the faithfulness of Yahweh as expressed in the covenant. The words echo the covenant of II Samuel 7 and acknowledge this faithfulness for all time. The writer turns to lament in the later part of the psalm (38-51) - after the king faced a disastrous defeat in battle.

Romans 16:25-7

In these concluding words to the Romans, Paul puts the life and words of Jesus Christ at the centre of their universe. The love that is the source of life is available for all people. Faith is about relationship to 'the only wise God, through Jesus Christ' (v.27). Christmas is very close and so is the promise of faith.

Luke 1:26-38

We have been waiting long enough. It is time for Mary to take her place in the Advent story. The angel Gabriel comes to Nazareth to speak to Mary. Mary listens to Gabriel's message and asks 'How can this be...' (v.34) – she is her own woman in the story. Perhaps if Mary had known what would happen to her soon to be born baby, she might well have been afraid, but for now Gabriel's reassurances are enough. The story is imbued with love and trust – the relationship between God and Mary is a two-way relationship. In the Magnificat, Mary's words give expression to this love and to the longing we have for the world to be transformed.

This Advent let's make time to connect with the God of Love and Life - who has our best interests at heart, who does not forget the people that are most often forgotten.

Prayer

Loving God

We give thanks for what we have, for our families and for food, for the love that connects us all.

We pray for people who are troubled and lonely, for those who have lost loved ones or live with constant pain, for those who are hungry, who live in dangerous places and who are denied water, food and justice.

We pray for the people of Tonga, rebuilding their lives after last year's eruption and tsunami. We pray for the well-being of each and every person who has lived through disaster and violence.

Help us find the courage to face the hard stuff, to make the changes that we can make, to share what we can.

In your loving name we pray.
