Fight Hunger with Food



Ama Takiloa members in Makaunga, Tonga show off lettuces grown in their Demonstration Garden. Their gardening was so successful that they have established an Extension Demonstration plot. With El Nino likely to bring drought to Tonga this summer, investing in food will be more important than ever.

Ahead of World Food Day the Food and Agricultural Organisation <u>reported</u> a decline in the numbers of undernourished people. It estimated 795 million people are hungry, down 167 million over the last decade. On World Food Day (16 October), the FAO <u>called</u> for more investment in social protection in rural areas where nearly 80% of poor people are found. It urged support for over 500 million small family farms to help eliminate hunger. Many CWS partners work with small farmers to improve their return and family nutrition. Monlar in Sri Lanka is one partner that has strengthened relationships with government policymakers in an effort to promote more sustainable farming practice for smallholders and promote food sovereignty.

Sparks in the Stubble

In Christchurch, Rod Oram was intent on lighting a few sparks at the Transitional Cathedral. Despite the magnitude of current crises ranging from ecological disasters to war in Syria, he expressed his belief that by making small change, big change will happen. At the well-supported gathering to celebrate 70 years of service, National Director Pauline McKay and retired Bishop David Coles recalled the first Christmas Appeal in 1945. Refugee Update

ACT Alliance continues to help record numbers of refugees reaching Europe with food, shelter and other assistance. The UNHCR <u>reported</u> over 643,000 people had arrived via the Mediterranean. Syrians see no hope at home. Refugees are worried borders will close in Europe. Please pray for them and support the <u>Syria Appeal</u>.

Last month DSPR Jordan ran more training for trainers' (refugee volunteers) workshops promoting girls' education and support for mothers as well as 2 children's forums, 5 life skills workshops for young people and one free medical day in Souf camp. They provided food and hygiene coupons to 220 Iraqi families.

Climate Negotiations

ACT Alliance along with 153 religious leaders from different faith groups handed over a

statement to Christina Figueres, executive director of the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change ahead of final <u>negotiations</u> in Bonn this week. The declaration calls for a fair and ambitious agreement, cuts in emissions, financial support and ecological stewardship.

World Disasters Report

The Red Cross <u>reported</u> 317 natural disasters affecting almost 107 million people in 94 countries last year. 87% of these disasters were climate related. The report highlighted the effectiveness of local groups in the first response although often underfunded.

Caritas has released its inaugural overview of environmental issues facing people in Oceania or the Pacific: "<u>Caring for our</u> <u>Common Home</u>".

Palestine/Israel: Peace Please

Concerned about growing violence, the ACT Palestine Forum <u>asks</u> the global community to hold to the vision of peace that is fading from their land.
